18 August	Book Launch: <i>The</i> Black Sash by Mary Burton Time: 17h30 Venue: Book Lounge, 71 Roeland Street, Corner Buitenkant and Roeland Streets, Cape Town	Fifty years after joining the Black Sash, Mary Burton is about to publish <i>The Black Sash</i> (Jacana Media), a book on the organisation's history and contribution to democracy. Mary Burton's first Black Sash protest stand was in Kalk Bay on a fine day in 1965, after the government had threatened to proclaim the historic fishing village 'white' under the Group Areas Act. Poster in hand, Burton and a group of women stood silently alongside the main road, black sashes draped across their bodies, the target of jeers – and the occasional murmur of encouragement. 	UCT academic discovers less invasive technique to inspect brain	UCT academic and medical specialist, Dr Llewellyn Padayachy, has discovered a new, less invasive technique to inspect brain and intracranial pressure in children. While most brain monitoring techniques are invasive, time consuming, require extensive infrastructure and often include drilling through the skull, Padayachy and his team have explored the potential of using ultrasound as a completely non-invasive, inexpensive, ubiquitous brain monitoring tool. Padayachy and his team have used this new method at the Red Cross War Memorial Children's Hospital to significantly improve accuracy while decreasing the cost and labour intensivity associated with traditional techniques.
