16 Sept	Faculty of Science Annual Distinguished Alumni Lecture: "Discovering the Okavango Delta" Time: 17h30 Venue: Lecture theatre 1, PD Hahn, Upper Campus UCT	Professor Terence McCarthy, an alumni of the Science Faculty at UCT and Professor Emeritus in the School of Geosciences at the University of Witwatersrand, will present this year's Faculty of Science Annual Distinguished Alumni Lecture. Over the past three decades, multidisciplinary research has unravelled the workings of the Okavango ecosystem. The findings revealed that geology, hydrology, climate, water and air borne sediment, aquatic and terrestrial vegetation, and animals, particularly termites and hippos, collectively sustain the extremely dynamic yet robust Okavango ecosystem. The lecture will deal with the thinking that has driven the research, the successes and failures along the way, and difficulties and excitement of working in pristine Africa.
