The exhibition, a project of the Centre for Curating the Archive at UCT, will be on display at the Castle of Good Hope, the oldest surviving colonial building in South Africa. The opening address will be delivered by Mary Burton, President of the Convocation of UCT and former National President of Black Sash.</p> <p>The images to be exhibited – many of them from 35mm-film negatives – hint of a time that has not yet passed.
