## UCT events and interview opportunities

New UCT research: Mammals, spiny plants and the origins of African savannas – The origin and spread of savannas is one of the great mysteries of the earth's ecological histories. A new study, recently published in Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences (PNAS), involving Emeritus Professor William Bond, Professor Muthama Muasya and Dr Tristan Charles-Dominique of the Department of Biological Sciences at the University of Cape Town (UCT) suggests that mammal herbivores play a key role in the spread of these grassy ecosystems that today cover about a fifth of the world's land surface. The new study analysed the distribution of nearly 2000 woody species from southern Africa and found that spiny plants are most common in arid savannas with high densities of mammal browsers.

One implication of the study, according to Professor Muthama Muasya, is that the loss of Africa's native browsing antelope may threaten the future of drier savannas, and lead to their replacement by dense woody scrub of little ecological or economic value.

- South African College of Music (SACM) student showcase ensemble **competition** – The South African College of Music will host the final round of the Schock Foundation Prize for chamber music. This is the ninth edition of this annual competition for ensemble playing, sponsored by the Schock Foundation. This final round will feature ensembles selected from the chamber music concerts throughout the year.
- A systematic review of the literature that focuses on both the `informal economy' and 'food security' in South Africa - The African Centre for Cities presents a seminar series exploring the informal economy, food systems, food security and urbanisation. As cities rapidly urbanise, different pressures are placed on the food

system which has resulted in the least nutritious food being the most affordable. The second seminar of this series, *A systematic review of the literature that focuses on both the 'informal economy' and 'food security' in South Africa*, presented by Candice Kelly and Etai Even-Zahav, discusses a paper that performed a qualitative systematic review of research from South Africa that addresses both food security and the informal economy – the first of its kind. Candice Kelly's doctoral research focuses on people leading food system transitions in South Africa. She teaches into the MPhil at the Sustainability Institute, focusing on sustainable food systems. Etai Even-Zahav is also part of the Food Systems team at the Sustainability Institute. He is particularly interested in the informal food economy.
